Although the company prides itself on its English sensibility, it is actually an American company started in Cambridge, Mass., in the early '70s. Named for the crabapple tree and John Evelyn, a 17th-century English conservationist, the company has long used natural botanical ingredients in its immensely popular bath, body and home products. Today, the natural philosophy remains, but thanks to a new spokesperson and new products, all traces of English stuffiness are gone. The company has tapped

to Lady Diana. She and her partner, David Flint Wood, live an enviable life with their three boys on Harbour Island in the Bahamas, where they run The Landing, a small hotel, restaurant and

Having lived in the Bahamas for some time, Hicks has, despite her glamorous blue-blood background, thoroughly embraced the island way of life. For her, that means slowing down to appreciate all that nature has to offer, including easy and practical beauty secrets used by island women for centuries. She shares this wisdom in her book, Island Life, which includes tips for healthy eating and living, and recipes for all-natural body treatments such as Avocado Cleanser, Exuma Salt Glow and Hibiscus Hair Shampoo. The book, available at Crabtree

& Evelyn stores and on its Web site, has been an inspiration for new products developed by the retailer, including the Naturals line of botanical-based body care formulas. The collection of 19 products is full of botanical extracts, oils and mineral complexes and leaves out the parabens, mineral oils, synthetic dyes and that scary, headline-making mystery ingredient found in so many beauty products: sodium lauryl

sulfate. The Naturals products, made with ingredients such as edamame, rice, bamboo, lemon grass, brown sugar, mango, cucumber and cocoa butter, include smoothing body scrubs in three formulas, foaming shower mousses, vitamin-rich body mists and body bars made with 20 percent grapeseed, almond and olive oil. Although the products are botanical-based, their fragrances contain no floral notes, meaning that nothing smells so girly that it can't be used by men, too. Clean, colorful packaging adds to the feeling that these are products you'd find in your bathroom at an exotic, tropical spa resort. Crabtree & Evelyn also has a

full line of skincare products designed to address such modern-day problems as dark circles, thinning pouts and spotty, wrinkled skin. Infused with skin-saving workhorses such as vitamins K and C, glycolic and salicylic acid, green tea, retinol and ceramides, the botanical face fixers are showing up as beauty-editor favorites in Glamour, Allure and InStyle.

Longtime customers need not fret that old favorites will disappear in the wake of change. Crabtree & Evelyn's bestselling, quintessentially English products, such as scented drawer liners, potpourri, rosewater hand cream and lily of the valley soaps are still available, right alongside all
